March 2024 President's Letter: What we do best

Daylight Savings Time starts March 10. That means group riding season starts March 11! KBC does several cool things: we put on a tour in June, offer grants to support cycling projects, connect with community through cycling shorts, advocate for cycling access and infrastructure. But maybe what we do best is organize group rides on the road. In fact, I think **KBC offers the best group rides** in the area. This is our main deliverable as an organization.

Group rides should be **Safe and Fun for Everyone**. That means welcoming new riders with a friendly face and help finding the right ride for them. It means sharing a pre-ride briefing so we have common expectations before we start. And it means communicating: not just social stuff, but being clear about what we're doing, identifying hazards, and checking on each other.

Everyone on a ride is responsible for keeping it safe and fun. But we charge ride leaders with the special duty to complete the pre-ride briefing and mid-ride reminders. Ride leaders are unsung heroes in our efforts to offer the best group rides in the area. To offer a small thank you to ride leaders, this year we are offering a 1-year extension of KBC membership for those who lead at least 6 rides this season. If you are interested in serving the cycling community, please consider leading or sweeping rides. You can apply HERE (<— Click me). We ask that all ride leaders watch the 30 minute ride leader summit video. A link will be sent to all who apply and thank you!

We are also experimenting with an additional communication tool this year. KBC has a Discord server which allows you to sign up for notifications on <u>just the rides you ride</u>. Our goal is that we can communicate quickly and specifically, without giving you information you don't need. Next newsletter will have more info about how to access Discord. See you on the road!

With spring riding season short at hand (flowers already popping, and I have seen some early bees buzzin' in late Feb), ride season will be here soon. KBC will need to sanction new ride leaders, and communication is being discussed to send out via Facebook, MailChimp, and Discord.

Pam Sotherland will be updating the questionnaire and will look to add the questions if members are interested in becoming a Ride Leader, Apprentice Ride Leader or Sweeper.

A proposal was made to grant a free year extension to Ride Leaders who lead more than 6 rides per year. Ride leaders could self-report via a Google form for the end-of-season submission.

John will announce pertinent KBC business at Monday night rides where we have the largest number of club members present. Will also announce membership benefits, for attending non-members, encouraging others to join KBC.

Finance

Pam Sotherland reviewed KBC Finances. KBC offers scholarships grants for KBC members to attend LCI (<u>League of Cycling Instructors</u>) – take advantage of it!

Open Roads. KBC approved the donation of \$1,000 to OpenRoads and the club will get its KBC logo on the Open Roads website.

KALTour

Insurance will be \$12 per individual for non-member riders.

We need to do an analysis to understand the impact of changing costs to KalTour. Propose making an EXCEL spreadsheet and run the numbers of members and non-members and see how different costs impact the bottom line. Three year breakdown would show solid statistics.

Ominvorous with Preferences

When people learn that I'm a cyclist they often ask one or two questions: 1) Isn't that dangerous? And/or 2) What kind of riding do you do? As we approach Daylight Savings Time and group riding season, let's think through their questions together.

Isn't that dangerous?

The most curious thing about this question is that people tend to ask it about the things they <u>don't</u> do and can't imagine doing. In other words, no one asks me, "Isn't that dangerous?" when they see me get out of a car. Or when I order a pulled pork barbeque sandwich. And they don't ask themselves, "Isn't this dangerous?" when they go sit in a movie theater with a large, buttered popcorn. (Note: I <u>love</u> popcorn, too!)

We seem to be pretty poor at assessing risk. One pulled pork sandwich probably won't kill you. But a lifetime diet of fatty sweetened red meat might make that life shorter than it could be. And one bike ride probably won't kill you. But a lifetime of physical activity can keep you living longer and healthier than it might be otherwise. I eat popcorn and barbecue, but also salads and grilled chicken. Over time I am working to change my preferences for leaner and greener food. And to change my activity preferences for longer and higher heart rate rather than passive and sedentary.

What kind of riding do you do?

When it comes to bikes, I like 'em all! I have skinny road bikes and fat mountain bikes. Gravel, tandem and race. Plus a pedal-assist e-bike. So, like my diet, I guess I am an omnivorous cyclist. But I do have preferences. And there is nothing on earth like the feeling of a fast group ride on smooth pavement. One where you finish tired but not shredded. Where the group seems to move as one body. Everyone smoothly pulling through the front of the paceline, keeping a steady speed, and catching their breath as they fall back. The feeling of flying as you descend and swoop through a turn. Oh, don't you love it?!

I am stoked to ride with you again this season! Let's make it a great year on the bike. Please be friendly to visitors and polite with motorists. Our goal with KBC rides is that they are safe and fun for everyone. See you soon!
