PRESIDENT'S LETTER — JOHN KNOWLTON

Failed Experiments and JWR!

KBC held elections this month and we are super happy to welcome Jacinda Roedel as Secretary! Treasurer Pam Sotherland, VP Paul Guimond and President John Knowlton were also re-elected. Thank you for your support.

Over the past three years that I have served as president, we have initiated some experiments. In an effort to engage the club with the community we tried some new things:

- -Encouraging members to participate in infrastructure planning meetings at the Kity of Kalamazoo, City of Portage, and Kalamazoo County
- -Launching Cycling Shorts, which saw us invite leaders to speak to the club meetings. We had visits from bicycle promotion organizations, municipal leaders, a bike mechanic, and representatives from a homeless advocacy group.
- -Organizing a slow roll on the Michigan Avenue bike lanes

When trying something new, I like to frame the new thing as an experiment. There are a couple reasons for this approach: 1) We don't know how it will work, so it is experimental. 2) If it doesn't work, we can simply end the experiment. It is the nature of experiments that some work and some fail.

KBC has between 450 and 500 members, depending on the year. A KBC

member team recently reviewed meeting attendance reported in the Pedal Press. Over the past 13 years the numbers have ebbed and flowed, but there are a steady dozen or two in attendance. The outlier in November 2017 saw a contested officers' election.

We hope to see everyone again next September!



Bike Friendly Kalamazoo

Garmin Varia Radar Review

I picked up the Garmin Varia on sale at the local bike shop. A trusted friend said that his radar was the one piece of technology that if he forgot to put it on his bike, he would turn around and go home. I got the mid-range model, radar plus light. The radar paired easily with my Garmin bike computer. I have used the radar for 3 months. Here are my thoughts.



Road riding – very helpful to know if there is a car behind you. When making a lefthand turn and needing to move into the lane to make the turn, looking at the radar gives you solid knowledge if there is a car in close proximity. I still look over my shoulder but I do so with some confidence that there is not a car close behind me. Also very helpful to know when a car is coming behind you so you are aware and can alert others in the group that there is a car coming.

Gravel riding – the radar is pure money on gravel rides. One of the reasons we ride gravel is the low census of cars once out on the country gravel roads. The issue with gravel is sometimes the gravel to the far right is a bit loose so we have a tendency to ride in right tire tracks for smoothness and safety. Riding on gravel can be louder than riding on the road and that makes it harder to hear if a car is coming from behind. The radar gives you the ability to know a car is coming and move as far to the right as safely possible. When riding gravel roads when it is very difficult to hear a car, the radar allows the cyclist to be both safe and courteous to the cars. I purchased an extra mount so I can easily move the radar between my gravel and road bike.

Sometimes the radar will pick-up a cyclist coming up from behind and give you a false positive. But I have never had the radar not show when a car is coming (no false negatives).

In my opinion, a solid piece of gear to add to the arsenal.

The High School That Self Selected KBC Members Attended, Its Location, and Nickname
