PRESIDENTS LETTER

Even the less attentive among you may lately have noticed a heavy emphasis on planning While a number of circumstances have contributed to this emphasis, three stand out. One Such circumstance is publicity deadlines—magazines need six to ten weeks warning before they reach their readers, other clubs need six to ten weeks or so (depending on when they meet), and riders make plans as far in advance as they can manage (How many of you hope to attend the Apple Cider Century next September?).

Another circumstance is that I spent a great deal of the last year doing in extended stretches things which could have been done at a more leisurely pace had appropriate decisions been made earlier. Publicity is not a difficult task, but it consumes a great deal of time. There's no reasonthat publicity can't be in small parcels and spread over a couple of months. Except that we have to make decisions before we publish them.

The third circumstance is that some things just require a lot of planning. to that end, a couple of proposals.

PROPOSAL I RECARDING THE KBC CAMPING EXPEDITION

Pick a location—perhaps Manistee (Manistee because its a tourist town, and near a national forest). A tourist area, it offers interesting and useful facilities like motels, resorts, private coampgrounds, and a nearby state park.

Activities remaining, once a locale is selected. (Some of these resemble busywork, but must be done.) Where do we ride once we arrive? (For this area it happens that the DNR has published bicycle touring maps. A place to begin) Exactly where do we stay? (What campgrounds are there? Do they accept reservations? What about motels we needn't be exclusively campers. Resorts? Make the necessary reservations.) Who's going to go? (Require reservations) Prepare all the necessary materials for the week-end.

Perhaps some participants will wish to bicycle up, or back. You might give ti some thought.

PROPOSAL II: REGARDING THE SPRING VALLEY READ SERIES.

It ought to be plain that we want to continue the same general pattern. Within that patter, I offer the following suggestins, believing them improvements. The entire program should begin later in the day. Local publicity must be improved immensely. Class A should be 50 miles, class B 30. We should offer a non-USCF event for women.

Thnings I have questions about, but no answers for: Juniors, Intermediates, Midgets, Veterans. Douglas G. Croft, Prize Money.

A NOTE: We do not plan a fall racing event, as both attempts to date have been disa strous. The only circumstance I can imagine which would justify the effort is the unexpected emergence of a sponsor willing to put up the \$1500 or more it would require to put on a major event (which would not take place at Spring Valley i think.)

The proposals differ because my objects differ. The camping tour needs to be put together, and while $I^{\circ}m$ willing to advise I am not willing to be in charge. Manistee came to mind because I spent a couple of summers up there, but I could as well have mentioned Traverse B_{ay} , or Southern Ontario, ob Western Kentucky. (not that Kentucky's a reasonable choice. Until some one takes charge this project won't move.

The race program, on the other hand merely needs some discussion. My comments here are an attempt to shape the discussion. I'll call a meeting in the near future: anyone interested in participating whould call me or I'll not consult you. I expect to bring a draft prospectus to the November meeting.
