Let's say I collect ten dollars at the start of the trip, and what isn't used on food will be returned at the end. I would like to know for sure one week in advancae how many people are going. ... The route is already mapped. It is generally: Kalamazoo to Bloomingdale, straight across to South Haven, up the shore drive to Saugatuck: return is via Allegan State Forest, into Allegan, over to Yankee Springs rec. area, (though no completely north into it,) and home south via Richland. Something like 140 miles total. Accomadations??? This is what I don't know: it was too early to call a church and make a "reservation" as it were, and besides, I didn't know if this was what people wanted, So... at this point camping out is the alternative: where?? I propose doing it in true touring style: we find out when we get there. Sans tent too. I would hope that people be willing to pack their own gear:;however if somebody wants to play it soft and arrange a sag wagon, that is up to them.

For a first whack club sponsored overnighter, perhaps this is too inexact: but as much of a "planner" as I am, I think its safe to a) leave a few things open and b) give this trip at least some of the sense of adventure that a real tour involves. ( It may therefore involve some of the discomfort fo a tour — e.g. sleeping in a cemetary in the rain!) What I chicken out to, then, is saying I'll lead the ride and all that entails, but promoting it, and making that one crucial decisions as to the nature of the accommadations I leave to the whims of ... those who actually committ themselves to the ride. "
