One thing most bike riders and dengineers agree on is this: it's ier for everyone when cars and es share the roads.

3ike paths are well-intentioned, serious cyclists, but no thanks, 'd rather be on the roads.'

While most cyclists feel unafortable riding in the roadway ng bigger, motorized vehicles, e paths cause more problems in they solve, say engineers and lists.

'A number of studies indicate yelists are safer when riding on normal road surface than on a arate bike path," said Herbert kin, Kalamazoo County Road nmission engineer-manager.
