## WHO REALLY NEEDS A CUSTOM FRAME ?

People have custom frames built for two main reasons, fit and options.

Some people simply can not properly fit on a production bicycle. Production frames do not take into consideration different body sizes. Others just can not find a frame small or large enough. A custom frame builder will take into consideration foot length, upper and lower leg length, torso length and arm length. Having a frame built specifically to ones measurements will give a more comfortable ride.

People also have frames built because they have gotten to the point where they can not buy what they want in a bike even though they can get a good fit. A frame builder will consider the riding style and the use for the bicycle when planning a frame. When ordering a custom frame you can get any color and cosmetics you wish. You can also get any braze-ons you would like, plus get the proper size and fit.

Another aspect of custom frames is the quality. The frame will be made by hand through every step. The custom frame buyer can equip his frame with each specific component he prefers.

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The following exerpt is from: Willis F. Dunbar, Michigan, A History of the Wolverine State (Grand Rapids, MI, Eerdmans Publishing Company, 1970). The period of reference is from 1890 to 1905.


"The first automobiles were built and sold at a time when a bicycle craze was sweeping the nation. Millions of "wheels," as they were called, were sold. Bicycle clubs sprang up, and a Michigan man, Horatio S. Earle, became president of a national association called the League of American Wheelman. The popularity of bicycling probably carried over to automobiles. and as will be noted later, the bicycle enthusiasts were the first advocates of improved roads. ... After the disappearance of the plank roads, cities and villages maintained their own streets, while the township was the unit for rural road maintenance. In 1893 the legislature passed an act permitting counties to take over this function if the voters of the county approved, but only eighteen counties had taken advantage of the law by 1905. As has been noted, the bicyclists were the pioneer enthusiasts for good roads. The national president of the League of Wmerican Wheelman in 1901—Horatio S. Earle-was also a member of the state senate, where he aponsored a resolution calling for a committee to report on improving highways. He became so prominent in the cause of better highways that he won the nickname "Good\_ Roads Earle." Under the provision of

the Constitution of 1850 prohibiting the state from engaging in internal improvements, the state was without authority for getting into the road building business. Earle campaigned successfully for the exemption of "public wagon roads" from this prohibition, and an amendment making this change was adopted by the voters in April 1905. The legislature at once established a State Highway Department, and Governor Warner appointed Earle as the first state highway commissioner. The same act provided "rewards" ranging from \$250 to \$1,000 per mile to townships and counties for building roads that met certain minimum standards."
