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1991 Ride Incentive Program

Contrary to popular belief, the KBC ride incentive program is in full effect for 1991. For new members who are unfamiliar with the program, the ride incentive program works like this: when you attend a Club ride, write your name and the mileage you'll ride on the sign up sheet that is provided by the ride leader or another Club member. The leader will send the sheet to the mileage keeper (the lovely and talented Jim Tiller). He'll add up all your Club miles for the whole year. At the Club Holiday party in December, we'll give the following awards to Club members with the following mileage:

- 500 miles: KBC Water Bottle
- 1000 miles: KBC Jersey
- 2000 miles: Special Award

(If any of you haven't yet received your awards from 1990, contact a Club officer.)

You can accrue mileage from KBC events or from invitational rides like the Cereal City Century. 75% of your miles must be from KBC events, though. If you attend an invitational ride, send notification of your mileage to the P.O. Box. You don't need any proof; we use the honor system.

What about April and May mileage?

Due to Stage Race planning and volunteer burn out, the ride incentive system worked poorly if at all in April or May. If you have any mileage from April of May Club rides, send it in to the P.O. Box on your own. Once again, the honor system prevails.

Regular Club Ride Descriptions

Mondays

• The Deep in the heart of Texas recovery ride:

Recover from your weekend race or century ride with an easy 2030 miles from Texas Drive Park near the corner of Milham and 8th Street. Look for the softball field. Led by Mark "12 tooth" Erhardt.

Tuesdays

• The KBC Track Series:

Race Team ride at the Kalamazoo Speedway near the corner of Ravine Rd. and "D" Ave. Organized by Mike Teel.

• The Dutch Treat Tuesday Ice Cream Ride:

A new ride, conceived and led by Nancy "the Bruiser" DeBoer. 20 30 miles from Parchment High School, on "G" Avenue about 1/2 mile east of Riverview. Nancy promises a stop in Richland or Plainwell for ice cream. Get in on the ground floor of a soon to be KBC tradition! (Note that this ride will be held on the 4th and 24th of June only.)

Wednesdays

 The Wednesday Night Mountain March:

OK, so there's no real mountain in Kalamazoo, but this ride is usually pretty hilly. Pioneered years ago by Don "Mondo Dondo" Povendo, this ride goes 20 30 miles from Kalamazoo Central High School on Drake Road about two miles north of West Main. This month led by Roberta "don'tyou dare print my nickname" Hillman.

Thursdays

• The Ice Cream Cruise:

The now famous ride and feeding frenzy in Scotts. Meet at the Scotts Elementary School for the ride, and stop in at Scooter's Malt Shop on the main drag in Scotts after your ride for great ice cream and socializing. Routes from 15 30 miles are usually offered. These rides are normally very well attended, so they're a good place to meet up with lots of Club members. Also a good start for first timers. The school is on QR Avenue, just two blocks east of 36th Street in "downtown" Scotts. In June, Vince "Crazy Legs" Odenwaller is taking over ride leader duties.

Fridays

• The Tour de Gull Lake:

Ride about 25 miles from Galesburg, around Gull Lake. The pace of this ride is hard to predict; usually the group splits in two, with the sane group enjoying the scenery around the lake, and the young punks (of any age) using the hills for oxygen debt orgies. The ride leaves from the parking lot behind Billy's Bike Shop in Galesburg, just east of the five way intersection in downtown Galesburg. Ride led by Bandit the Wonder Dog. The Adventures of Spike Bike

In the year 1998, one man fights the tyrrany of the automo-bile...]

The image of a white panel truck grew ominously in myhelmet mirror. The vehicle's speed and the faces of the two men inside left little doubt as to their intentions. As they got closer, I saw what they had in mind. The passenger had a fourfoot section of heavy water pipe stuck out the window, in-tending to play a little polowith Yours Truly's skull. This would call for perfect timing, but then, it always does. I faded towards the right shoulder, and the van did the same. But then, at the last possible moment, instead of going off the road. I darted in front of the van and went off on the left shoulder, into the grass, throwing the bikeinto a controlledskid. The driver reacted the way I'd hoped. He cut the wheel sharply to the left, still intent on having his pal brain me, and lost it when he hit the brakes to avoid a utility pole. The van skidded wildly, rolled onto its side, and slid to a halt 100 feet down the road. I picked up the bike and rode over tothe wreck, tossed a grenade through a shattered window, and sped away. The explosion was spectacular, as thegrenade touched off something, a propane tank, maybe, inside thetruck.

It gave me no satisfaction. This was the third one today, and I'd only been out a couple of hours. My mood blackened, just as the smoke from the plumbing truck blackened the sky. Whenwould it end? "Spike, m'boy (I said to myself), you need avacation." I headed home, packed up a few things, and caught thenext flight to Calgary.

Ineeded to pick up a couple of Dura-

Ace gruppos, anyway. Canada had no Bicycle Actand no Japanese trade restrictions, unlike what was left of the States, and I was really looking forward to getting to my cabin and putting in a few days of mountain biking without having to bring along an arsenal. After a couple of hours of tearing up and down the trails, I found myself on the road, heading down the mountain and into town. Icould do with some breakfast. I heard a roar behind me, theunmistakeable sound of knobby tires. I looked back to see ajacked- up Jeep Cherokee following me down the twisting, gravel road. Nothing to worry about, I thought, this is Alberta, afterall. I hadn't lost my instincts though, and I kept an eye on it. As soon as it was close enough for me to see the Illinois plates, I sprang into action, heading for some rocks near theedge of the road. He barely missed me, and put some big gouges in the side of the Jeep as he sideswiped the boulder I cut behind.

It was two men, American men. Just my luck. Goddam tourists, and drunken ones at that. They didn't stop to inspect the damage, just threw a bag of empty beer cans and cigarette buttsin my direction, and sped off down the road. I didn't have so much as a firecracker with me, and I stood there, impotent, shaking with rage and frustration.

A clear head soon returned, though. There were no motelsin the little town at the foot of the mountain, just a grocery store and a couple of restaurants. They could only be staying at one or two places, campgrounds up the mountain. They would be back, probably soon. I made afew preparations down the road and doubled back to the spot where I first encountered them. No more than 45 minutes passed before I once again spotted the roaring blue Cherokee coming up the road, laden, nodoubt, with beer and junk food for another day's revelry. Ihefted the bag of garbage they'd tossed out

before and waitedbehind a rock. As they roared past, I hurled the bag at thedriver, shouting "hey, you dropped something!" It hithim in the head.

As I expected, he slammed on the brakes and skidded to ahalt, manhandling the Jeep to get it turned around on the narrow mountain road. By the time he got it straightened out, I was a good 200 yards ahead of him, which was all I needed. I kept him in sight, making sure he wouldn't lose me, as I headed down the old fire road from which I'd removed the barricades. The surface was bumpy, barely navigable for both me and the Jeep, but it would get a lot worse — for them. I spottedt hem closing in behind me, nearly bouncing out of their seats. That's it, buddy, watch me and not the road. Just alittle farther. Atopa sharp rise, a chasm 10 feet wide and perhaps 40 feet deep cut accross the old road. The bridge had long since collapsed, but I'd laid a foot-wide plank accross the abyss. I shot accross with the Jeep nearly on my back wheel. As the heavy vehicle lurched over the edge, the plank snapped like a toothpick and it and the Jeep tumbled to the floorof the ravine.

After a while, I peered over the edge. The only sound frombelow was the babble of the little stream at the chasm's floor, which now ran under the wreckage, carrying away beer cans and little scraps of trash. What a shame, to pollute such a pristine wilderness. Before I headed back toChicago, I would call the RCMPanonymously—and tell them about the mess. In the mean time, I had a couple of days to take it easy, breathe the clean mountain air, and get in some moretrail riding. After today, though, I'd tuck my 9mm Browning into one of the panniers, just in case I ran into someunfriendly critters, like bears. Or more tourists from theStates.
