

DNR Looking For Support For Proposed Trailway

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources is seeking public support for another local multi-user rail-to-trail conversion similar to the Kal-Haven Trail as part of their State-wide trail network. The proposal consist's of an extension of the Grand Rapids Kent Trail system to Allegan, then to Kalamazoo and Battle Creek via the Kalamazoo River valley. The section of the trail proposal locally stretches from Otsego to Battle Creek via Kalamazoo and has been named "The Kalamazoo River Valley Trailway" by a group under the auspices of the River Partners Program/ Kalamazoo Forum. This group and the DNR are seeking support from local governments for assisting in the planning and maintenance responsibilities while the DNR itself would secure the land and carry out construction. A show of citizen support is critical for the DNR to go ahead with the development of the trail and you can do that by writing a letter to: Michigan Natural Resources Commission; Mr. Lawrence DeVuyst, Chairman; Box 30028; Lansing, MI 48909.

DNR Asks For Input Into Allegan State Game Area Management Proposal

User group input into the DNR's Allegan State Area Strategic Management Plan is requested by the DNR. Copies of the plan should be at local libraries. However, KBC attained a copy and Cal Lamoreaux currently has it if anyone has questions. The general feeling is that the plan falls far short in accommodating mountain bike activity in the Area. MMBA Executive Director, Dwain Abramowski, was able to make a pitch for mountain bikers at one of the public meetings, however. If you are a mountain biker who uses the trails at Allegan State Game Area and want to know what is happening give us a jingle.

LMB Sponsors ISTEA Conference

On March 27th, in Lansing, LMB sponsored an Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) conference. ISTEA is the bill that cyclist's nationwide have worked hard for so many years, and it's on our doorstep now for us to finally take advantage of on the local level. At the conference, experts were on hand to give bicycle advocates the information needed to make their communities more bicycle friendly. How bicyclists can benefit from the bill, what bicycle facility best fits each need, why sidepaths should be avoided, the Enhancement Projects application process, etcetera. Those who went, Cal Lamoreaux, from Shelbyville, for example, came back pumped! The word from LMB is they need an ISTEA rep for the Kalamazoo area, and as of right now, there isn't one. We need someone to help coordinate and identify possible enhancement projects in the area. Do you know of someone, how about you? Do you know of roadway hazards that could be improved? Make a wish list and let us know. We need to get more active as a Club and help our local officials implement bicycle enhancement projects in our area. The time has arrived, let's get jumping.

Notes From Your President

I could start by lamenting over the loss of our co-sponsorship of the Trailblazer. But I didn't sign on to lament over spilled grapes. I signed on because I felt I could somehow help our organization get better organized. To get over the hump, so to speak, so we wouldn't have those problems in the first place.

While we have a lot of great people making wonderful contributions, we're still suffering from a lack of involvement and the organization necessary to achieve what our members, and the cycling community as a whole, seem to expect from us. Sure, we're basically only a Social Club, so let's be realistic—but, we're basically no different than any other bike club in any other city anywhere across the country. For example, helping local governments overcome bicycle ignorance and assisting in the education of bicycle users are only two examples of what Club's like us are currently struggling with and are only limited by the people and money to do it—simple as that. But first it takes organization, and that's where we need to focus at least some of our attention—the sooner the better.

Right now we have too few people doing too much. Many are on the verge of, or have already burned out. Work loads in their careers or in school are heavy, making Club commitments scarce. To rectify this problem we all have to be sensitive to the needs of our current members and continue signing up new members for obvious reasons—to spread the workload.

So far, this year, we have conducted a survey of our members to get input on your cycling habits and what you want out of your Club. Results are now being compiled and we'll report the results just as soon as they're finished via these pages.

We're also taking a look at our Constitution to see what improvements can be made. Letters have been sent to other Club's requesting copies of their Bylaws and Phil Caruso informs me that they have responded. So, our committee will be going to work sometime this month. Have a look for yourself, a copy of our current Constitution is enclosed. Have any comments or suggestions? Send them to Phil at the Club PO Box. They'll report on their progress and bring each suggested change to a vote only after you've been informed also via these pages.

If your looking for a cause in which to make a personal commitment to, a place to meet great people, and a place where you can make a contribution to your community—look no further. Cycling, in itself, is a great cause. KBC is loaded with great people. And, yes, you can make a contribution. Look no further, we have a niche for you!. Get involved!

Some of us will not be able to make more of a contribution than buying a membership, or maybe going on a Club ride—that's ok, your money will be well spent. Some of us are already doing more then should be expected—we know, and we'll find you some help. But we can get better organized and make a more serious effort to accommodate the needs of our members, and then maybe more of us will be willing to make those extra commitments necessary to reach those goals spelled out in our own Constitution.

Also, there seems to be, or has been, some antagonism going on between those who race and those who don't. If your a dues paying member, our Club doesn't differentiate—and we really don't need to waste time. Just be sensitive and respect other's cycling interests.

The same goes for the somewhat obscure "joke", in reference to ride classifications in the last Pedal Press, that was misconstrued by some as fact. We currently have no ride classifications and we apologize if you were offended.

KALAMAZOO BICYCLE CLUB ARTICLES OF CONSTITUTION

(adopted at the June 1991 Meeting, amended at the November 1992 Meeting)

Name and Goals

Name:

The name of the organization is the Kalamazoo Bicycle Club.

Goals:

The Kalamazoo Bicycle Club is a non-profit organization whose goals are to:

Promote bicycle safety through education and publicity.

Encourage and facilitate bicycle touring, racing, and recreational riding.

Defend and protect the rights of cyclists.

Encourage the allocation and development of facilities for cycling on public

lands and roadways.

Advocate recognition of the bicycle as a vehicle for pleasure, health, and

economical and environmentally sound transportation.

Membership

Eligibility:

Anyone who shares the goals of the Kalamazoo Bicycle Club is eligible for membership. A member in goodstanding is one who has file an application for membership with an appropriate officer of the Club and has remitted the current annual dues. Membership ends on December 31 of each year. Memberships purchased after September 1 are valid until December 31 of the following year.

Dues:

The dues will be set yearly by the President, subject to the approval of the

membership.

Discipline:

A member may be expelled from the Club for up to one year by the executive

board for any of the following:

Disregard for safety during a Club activity.

Misuse of Club funds or property.

Harassment of Club members or participants in Club activities.

Officers and Executive Board:

The following Officers will be elected by those in attendance at the annual meeting or by absentee ballot received at the Club Post Office box before the annual meeting date.

Elected Officers:

President:

The President presides at all meetings and is responsible for the overall conduct of the business of the Club. The President appoints committees to plan and execute Club activities. The President authorizes spending of Club funds.

- **Vice President:** The Vice President assumes the duties of the President when the President is absent. The Vice President is responsible for arranging for the Club meet ing sites and meeting programs.
- **Treasurer:** The Treasurer maintains the Club treasury, making deposits and disburse ments at the direction of the President and Vice President.
- **Secretary:** The Secretary keeps minutes of the Club meetings and the correspondence of the Club.

The above officers constitute the executive board of the Club. A majority of the executive board may act on official Club business.

Appointed Officers:

- **Newsletter Editor:** Responsible for publishing the Club newsletter which includes the monthly meeting minutes, meeting notices, monthly ride schedule, and any other items of general interest to Club members.
- **Ride Committee Chair:** Responsible for scheduling weekly Club rides throughout the year.
- **Safety Committee Chair:** Responsible for promoting bicyclesafety in the West Michigan area.
- Membership Database Administrator: The Database Administrator will keep up to date records of the Club roster and supplies this information to the Newsletter Editor on request.

If an officer is unable to complete his or her term of office, the officer will be replaced by Presidential appointment or election at the next Club meeting.

Elections: Elections of the Kalamazoo Bicycle Club Officers are held each year at the annual (November) meeting. Nominations and elections are held on the following schedule:

October meeting: Nominations from those in attendance. November Newsletter: Announcement of nominees. November meeting: Election of officers.

Amendments: Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed by any member of the Club and may be incorporated into this Constitution if approved by a simple majority of the members at a regular meeting.
